COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Like people, mice and rats need food, water and shelter to survive. Take the following steps to prevent rats and mice in and around your property:

- Use rodent-proof garbage cans with tight-fitting lids to eliminate food supply.
- Don't leave pet food out overnight.
- Clean up pet droppings daily.
- If you have a bird feeder, place it at least 48 inches above ground level. It should be kept clean and never be overfilled.
- Remove material and tall vegetation that could be used for shelter. Trim weeds and brush and keep grass short to minimize cover and food sources.
- All building materials, lumber, boxes, firewood and similar items should be stored either on rat-proof paved areas or stacked 18 inches above the ground.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Did you know the Berkley Department of Public Safety is in the home stretch of the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police/Michigan Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission accreditation process? This is a voluntary process where departments need to meet and prove they are following 108 standards.

Why accreditation?

- Accreditation is a proactive and ongoing "health check" of the organization's defined processes and its execution.
- It supports a culture of continuous improvement through voluntary commitment to review best practices and how organizations choose to apply them.
- It can identify areas of professional excellence and where organizational growth is needed.
- Clearly defining organizational expectations supports strong service delivery and creates sustainability during succession.
- Internal reviews and the external validation by outside parties increases trust and transparency with those who the organization serves and department members.

As of now, there are 58 accredited agencies and another 60, including BDPS, in the process out of 844 law enforcement agencies in Michigan. The BDPS "mock" assessment took place on April 25, and we anticipate the actual assessment taking place later this summer.

This has been a multiyear process that includes many updates to policies, procedures and the physical building. We look forward to continuing this process to better serve our community.
